You can stop the train by pushing him off the bridge onto the track in front of the train. He will die, but the five will be saved.

However, as you again watch in horror, you suddenly realize that standing next to you on the bridge is a very large man: if he were to fall onto the track in front of the trolley, his bulk is substantial enough that it would stop the trolley, although the fat man would undoubtedly be killed in the process.
